Are Arbitrators Humans?

<u>Arbitrators have tendency to rely excessively on</u> <u>intuition</u> that may exacerbate the impact of illusions on their decision making. <u>Our results</u> <u>reveal that "arbitrators are human" and perform</u> <u>about the same as judges.</u>

Research Conducted on Judges and Arbitrators



A city has a drawbridge that operates only from spring to autumn (arbitrators and judges) were asked to determine whether the city should hire a bridge operator during winter.

Group One: 24/100% of the subjects who were asked to rely only on the facts above considered the city responsible to hire a bridge operator off-season.

Group Two: 57/100% were given the additional historical fact that "hiring a bridge operator could have prevented debris from becoming lodged under the bridge and causing a flood."
